The workshop **Keynote Speaker** is: Prof. <u>Bruno Arpino</u> (University of Padua).

Bruno Arpino is a full professor in Social Statistics at the Department of Statistical Sciences, University of Padua (Italy). His previous appointments include positions at the University of Florence (Italy) and at the Pompeu Fabra University (Spain) where he also co-directed the Research and Expertise Centre for Survey Methodology (RECSM). His research interests are in the areas of causal inference, social gerontology and demography. His substantive research focuses on intergenerational relationships, and older adults' use of digital technologies, health and wellbeing. He is an associate editor of the European Journal of Population and published articles in peer-reviewed journals such as Computers in Human Behavior, Demography, European Sociological Review, Journal of Marriage and Family, the Journals of Gerontology: Series B, Journal of the Royal Statistical Society - A and C, Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS).

Keynote Speech:

Intergenerational Relationships and Older People's Use of Digital Technologies

Across Europe and around the globe, there is a notable demographic shift towards an aging population. As our societies become increasingly digitalized, older individuals find themselves navigating a world where internet access and digital technologies are fundamental for accessing essential services, maintaining social connections, and receiving support and care. In light of these changes, it is imperative to explore how the adoption or avoidance of digital technologies impacts the social relationships and overall well-being of older adults.

This talk will delve into recent research examining the bidirectional link between family ties and the use of digital technologies among older individuals. We will explore the intricate interplay between family dynamics and older adults' digital engagement, investigating the extent to which intergenerational relationships influence their technology use. Additionally, we will analyze how the use of digital tools affects intergenerational connections.
